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2010 July 4th Neighborhood Picnic at the Boat House!

You won't want to miss this event, so bring your picnic lunch, blankets and folding chairs, and join us from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Boat House on Sunday, July 4th!

Summertime is special at Washington Park because of all the wonderful activities the park offers. One of the most anticipated events is the 8th annual Fourth of July neighborhood picnic at the boat house co-sponsored by the Washington Park East and West Washington Park neighborhood associations and local business owners.



The festivities kick off at 11 a.m. with kids and their parents exploring the Station 21 fire truck in the boat house parking lot, visiting with the Denver Mounted Patrol horses, listening to the patriotic music played by the Denver Municipal Band's Brass Quintet, and checking out free giveaways and information at the sponsors' tables.



Arrive early so that your children can decorate their strollers, trikes, and bikes for the parade, which begins about 11:45 a.m., with the free decorations provided. The bike parade starts from the parking lot just east of the boat house, make its way alongside the recreation center and then around the small playground to the west and ends back at the boat house. The procession takes 15 to 20 minutes with each participant receiving a ribbon at the end.

Free ice-cream and beverages are provided immediately following the parade, while they last. (Also, the full 40 piece concert band returns that evening at 7:30 p.m., in the meadow, south of the recreation center, for your listening pleasure.)

As is true every year, volunteers are essential to making this event a success. We are looking for people to volunteer for one hour or more with the following activities:

- decorate the boat house,
- toy and decoration stations, and
- outline the parade route with American flags,
- set-up and staff the food/beverage tables
- remove decorations and clean up after the event.

In addition, parade route monitors are also needed to assist with bicycle safety and to help clap for our parade participants.

How to Organize your Own Block Party

Block parties are great fun and a terrific way of getting to know your neighbors. Find someone else on the block to share the work and just do it. It doesn't need to be elaborate; it just needs to include your neighbors.

Due to space limitations in this issue of our newsletter, we did not have the space to print the entire "How to Organize Your Own Block Party" article. This will be one of two topics at the WWPNA Annual Meeting on April 28th. It will also be posted on the Home page of the website at www.wwpna.org.

Block parties are great fun and a terrific way of getting to know your neighbors. Block parties have been recognized as a very positive and powerful way for people to connect on their blocks to build stronger, healthier, and more cohesive communities. One of the most important things to remember when organizing a block party is that it should be visible. The best way to do that is by closing off the street to traffic and having it in the street or having the party in someone's front yard or a series of front yards.

Getting Started...

1. Start talking to your neighbors about having a block party.
2. Canvass the block and find 1-2 other people to help you - kids are great resources!
3. Have a planning meeting with others who are interested.
4. Choose a date, time, and place (1-2 months notice is good)
5. Create a flyer
6. Understand permits, insurance, barricades, notification of police, etc. - (See the next section.)
7. Identify volunteers to pick up permits, barricades, food, etc.
8. Invite neighborhood police officers and/or firefighters.
9. Invite your city council representative, county commissioners, and/or elected officials.
10. Contact local paper for coverage if desired.

Recommendations for a Successful Block Party...

- Choose a shady spot in the street
- Have a barbeque, potlucks are great, too!
- Have games with prizes for children and adults - chalk art is great to draw in the street
- Feature entertainment by residents
- Take lots of pictures
- Have sign-in sheets for participants

Potential Costs...

- Barricade rental (See next section)
- Permit and insurance (See next section)
- Food and beverages
- Entertainment and decorations
- Games

Fundraising Ideas...

- Take up a collection on your block
- Have a bake sale on your block
- Take advantage of NRC-Colorado's Party Pak (check the NRC site for an application for this freebie for paper plates, napkins, cups, plastic ware, and ice cream at <http://www.nrc-neighbor.org/> under the Grants page.)

Quick Tips To Remember...

Don't organize a party alone. Ask a few neighbors for suggestions and tell them how they can help with as little as one hour of their time for delivering flyers or party set-up/clean-up.

Advertise early and often. Two months notice gives people the opportunity to schedule their other activities around the date.

Announce there will be free stuff - food, music, face painting, prizes - to help boost attendance.

Have a few small, but nice, door prizes from local record stores, restaurants, theatres, and flower shops.

Invite neighborhood kids to help plan the party. They can provide information on what kids want to do, what they'd enjoy eating, and what they can contribute to the event.

Take pictures and show them off in a scrapbook at all future parties.

Have a party theme to make the party memorable. Examples include an open house where everyone starts at one house on the end of the block and visits each home and parties that are held to support a cultural, ethnic, or annual municipal celebration.

Petitions, Permitting, Insurance and Barricades

The City and County of Denver requires 4 things to shut down a street and throw a block party. They have tried to lay out the process and forms at this website; <http://www.denvergov.org/Portals/490/documents/BlockpartiesER1209.pdf>. The process looks much more intimidating than it is. Note: if you hold your party in conjunction with National Night Out on Tuesday, August 3rd, the City waives the insurance fees.

1) Petition, Permission: First, organizers must get permission from 75% of residents on the block to be closed, and every resident must be notified. The petition form is included in the above link.

2) Insurance: There is a third party insurer for "special events" through TULIP, and the link is included above. You can get a quote through the site without having to purchase. The two items that affect the cost most will be a) number of people (over/under 100/500) and the presence of alcohol. Please note, the phrase presence of alcohol was used. If there are a number of people who BYOB, or BYOW, it would be safer to insure for alcohol.

3) Permits: Once you have obtained the Petition and the Insurance, you can get a permit, free of charge, either at the Wellington Webb Building, 201 W. Colfax, or at the Wastewater Dept. at 2000 W. 3rd Ave.

4) Barricades: The City/County of Denver requires the rental Type 3 Barricades, 2 barricades at each end, to block off either end of the street. Two possible rental companies are Road Safe

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New Alternative for Seniors

The demographic trends in Denver mirror those of the rest of the United States, and the world. Our population is growing older, a trend made visible by the wave of baby boomers beginning to reach retirement. By 2030, some 70 million Americans will be 65 or over. Many people are unsatisfied with the current options available to them as they age, and organizations like Washington Park Cares are one new alternative.

In December of 2005, Bill and Pera Beth Eichelberger, a couple in their 80s living near Wash Park, read an article about Beacon Hill Village, an organization in Boston, MA which aimed to help older adults stay in their homes. Recognizing the need for something similar in Denver, this ambitious pair set about establishing Washington Park Cares. This volunteer based nonprofit has been functioning in nine neighborhoods of south-central

Denver for nearly two years.

Washington Park Cares is a member organization, run almost entirely by volunteers. Members can call one phone number and find solutions to many problems. Need a ride to a doctor's

appointment or to the grocery store? How about a light bulb changed, leaves raked, snow shoveled, or minor home repair?

Volunteers provide these services on a regular basis. For larger tasks which volunteers are not

equipped to handle (such as roof repair or home health care), Washington Park Cares has a list of vetted service providers, many of whom will offer discounted services to our members. In addition, Washington Park Cares recognizes that in order to remain in one's home or neighborhood, social and community connections are vital. Educational and social events are offered on a regular basis, including a book club, weekly walk in Wash Park, monthly dinners at area restaurants, and other activities.

On April 6, 2010, Washington Park Cares sponsored the opening of a Wellness Clinic, in conjunction with the Cherry Creek Rotary Club. The clinic is offered to anyone in the community aged 55 and over, and offers blood pressure checks and blood sugar tests, as well as general health education and assessment. Washington Street Community Center hosts the clinic on the first and third Tuesday of the month, from 1pm-3pm. University Park United Methodist Church hosts the clinic on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month, also from 1pm-3pm. All are welcome!

Traffic at 303-298-8407 and Warning Lights at 303-936-2990.

Special Notes:

- 1) RTD bus routes: Streets that have RTD bus routes will need to contact RTD so that bus routes may be modified for that date.
- 2) Arterials / Collectors: For arterials and collectors (Downing, Logan, Lincoln) shutting down the street will not be allowed. Possible alternatives are to have the block party on a number of contiguous front lawns or in the Park, but the Park would require Park fees.
- 3) Questions: Questions about the process can be directed to Public Works Permit Operations at 303-446-3759. They were extremely helpful while I was writing this article!!
- 4) Updates: Any updates to this article will be posted on the Home page at www.wwpna.org. As you organize your block party, give me some feedback so we can help others!!

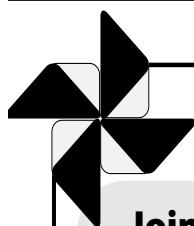
Honorees Recieve Good Neighbor Award

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Xcel Energy has Begun Gas Line Replacement

Over the next several years, Xcel Energy is replacing 600 linear miles of gas pipe line throughout Colorado. Nearly 100 linear miles are in the Denver metro area, with the remainder being throughout the state. This replacement will result in continued reliable gas service for current and new customers.

We have started replacing gas line in your neighborhood. It is our desire and intention to provide the residents, businesses and neighbors in the area where we will be doing work with more advance notice when a project of this magnitude is undertaken.

Xcel Energy has contracted with Q3 Contracting to replace gas pipeline for these projects:

* South Broadway, South Logan Street and South Washington Street from East Virginia Avenue to East Arizona Avenue. Work started in mid-April and continues throughout the month of August.

* Sherman Street, Grant Street, Logan Street, and Washington Street from East 4th Avenue to East Center Avenue. Work started in mid-April and continues throughout the month of October.

These projects may include work along side streets and adjacent streets. Additionally, inclement weather may cause delays during the project.

The general hours of construction are 7:00 am to 5:30 pm Monday through Friday. Parking along Broadway, Logan, Washington, Virginia, Arizona, Sherman, Grant, 4th, Center, and on side streets may be limited and driveways may need to be blocked for short periods of time. We apologize in advance for any inconvenience this may cause.
